*Men's costumes tend to cost on the lower end, and women's on the higher end. We are projecting to meet funding costs next year.

Adult Division



The adult division has been dancing to Rembetika/Asia Minor songs, with a Hassapiko from Constantinople being worked on. Other areas of concentration have been dances from Naxos, with a special emphasis on the variety and styles of Ballos dances from the Dodecanese and the Cyclades. Individual traditions have also been tackled, including Gikna, and the wedding bread with each lead dancer putting their "flouri" on the tray.

What's Up?

Senior Division

The senior division is busy this year as they are preparing something fresh. Aki is currently teaching dances from Epiros, specifically from the Greek/Vlach villages of the Mastorohoria (Konitsa). Their Greek Fest performance will have a "panigyri" feel, and will feature dances such as Patinada, Sta Dio, Sta Tria, Rihtos, Padiotiko, Kato Sta Eksi Marmara, Thlikotos, Tsamiko, and Ehasa Mantili.

Konitsa is not the only set of dances that the seniors are working on.

Women's Cretan

Costume

"Sartza" or "Anogeiani"

There are many traditional costumes for women on the island of Crete. Aside from the Sfakiani, Kouda, and other variations, the dance group currently has a collection of the "Anogeiani" costume. The costume is named after the famous village of Anogeia. The alternate name for the costume is also the "Sartza," which is named after the apron that is worn with it.



Junior Division

The Junior Division is focusing on learning basic styles of various regions of Greece to facilitate their transition from Greek School into RDG. They have focused primarily on learning dances from the mainland regions of Roumeli and Messolonghi in preparation for their 25th of March Gala performance! We are excited for them to continue their learning of the Dodekanisa Island and Thraki regions as we work up to Greek Fest.

Intermediate Division

The Intermediate Division has been busy at work refining their skills for more difficult sets like Crete and a major focus on incorporating more difficult dances into their Anatoliki Romylia set. In the upcoming year we are excited for them to learn some newly choreographed tavern dances and continue to develop their comfort with freestyle dances like couples syrto from the Kyklades. They will be performing some of their newly learned dances from Anatoliki Romylia at the gala in March!

Grades

Grades 3-6

For Grades 4-6, their hard work and dedication to learning more complex dances like Tsamiko, Kalamatiano, Ikariotiko tis Sibetheras and other dances have been truly inspiring. Their singing for Milo Mou Kokino has been absolutely amazing, filling the room with so much spirit. We're especially proud of the Grade 4s for catching up quickly and working seamlessly alongside the Grade 5s and 6s.

As for the Grade 6s, this year is particularly special as it's their final year dancing with Greek school. They've been doing an excellent job and are leaving a legacy of hard work and passion for the younger students to follow.



Men's Cretan Costume



"Salvari"

There are two variations of the men's costume in Crete: the "gilota" and the "salvari." Our dance group possesses 8 "salvari" costumes that comprise a "sariki" (headscarf), "vraka" (pants), "stivania" (boots), "meitanogileko" (vest), and "zonari" (sash). It said that the more embroidery on a man's vest shows how much his wife really loves him.

Aporkries in Naousa

Romiosyni was fortunate to learn the dances and traditions of Naousa at Klironomia 2004. As part of our session, our instructor Giorgos Pipilas taught dances of the "Genitsaroi" and "Boules."

Background

On the "Kyriaki tis Apokrias" and the "Kyriaki tis Tyrinis," the sound of the zourna and the daouli accompanies the dancers with every step, as they dance in the streets of Naousa in groups (bouloukia).

This special carnival custom dates back to the 18th century, while some say it could have ancient roots.

The Routine

In the morning, the bouloukia come together and the Genitsaroi get dressed. The Genitsaroi costume, with its main element the foustanella, consists of many accessories and is complemented by a characteristic mask with very small openings for the eyes and mouth.

The man who will dress as the Bride wears a wide, fancy floral dress with accessories that characterize the local women's costume of Naousa. He also wears the mask (without a mustache) and a bridal headdress with flowers and ribbons.

Before noon, they gather at the city hall and get the mayor's permission to dance in the city. They continue dancing in the streets and in the afternoon, their face masks are removed.
